Dr. Jake Newsome is a scholar of German and American LGBTQ history. He earned his Ph.D. from the University at Buffalo (SUNY), and his research focuses on Holocaust history, gender and sexuality, and memory studies. His current book project, *Pink Triangle Legacies: Coming Out in the Shadow of the Holocaust* explores the fate of gay and lesbian Holocaust victims, and the role that Holocaust memories played in gay rights activism. Dr. Newsome is the recipient of multiple research and teaching awards, scholarships, and fellowships. He is also a public scholar and international speaker, who has presented at the Library of Congress for the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising, and was invited to Paris by the French government to speak about the memorialization of gay Holocaust victims. As a public historian, he is dedicated to guiding learners through a study of history to develop an ethical sense of compassion, establish an understanding of the power of human agency, and wrestle with the ideals and challenges of responsible citizenship.

Pink Triangle Legacies: Gay Rights in the Shadow of the Holocaust

Gay and lesbian communities have long been regarded as one of the “forgotten victims” of the Nazi regime. Yet, were they truly forgotten? Relying on archival evidence, Dr. Jake Newsome reveals how societies purposefully silenced gay Holocaust victims for decades, which had devastating consequences for generations of gay Germans. Ignored by the historical profession and the majority of the population, gay communities set out to write their own history, and transformed the pink triangle - the badge once forced upon gay concentration camp prisoners - into a global symbol of social activism and positive identity. The history of the pink triangle’s transformation teaches us about the dangers of ignoring the past, as well as the power of history to heal and empower communities. *(45 minutes. Requires audio and visual. Presentation includes images of archival material, including government documents, newspaper articles, and gay rights fliers, as well as gay Holocaust survivor testimony.)*

“They’re Enemies of the State!” The Nazis’ Violent Campaign against the LGBTQ Community

Drawing on archival material, Dr. Newsome sketches the lived experiences of members of the German LGBTQ community during the Holocaust, and explores how Nazi understandings of sexuality, race, citizenship, and power were all related. In doing so, he untangles the complex motivations that convinced Nazi leaders that combating homosexuality was vital to the success of the Third Reich. The result was the destruction of the vibrant gay communities that had emerged during the Weimar years, and the targeting, torture, and murder of tens of thousands of gay Germans. And while the Holocaust ended with the defeat of Nazi Germany in May 1945, gay survivors soon learned that the era of state-sanctioned persecution was not over. *(45 minutes. Requires visual only. Presentation includes statistical graphs and archival material, including Nazi records and artifacts produced by gay victims themselves.)*
